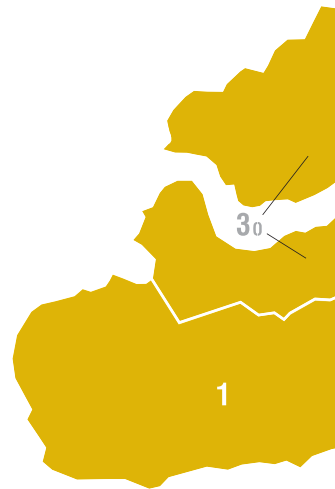
## from the Director

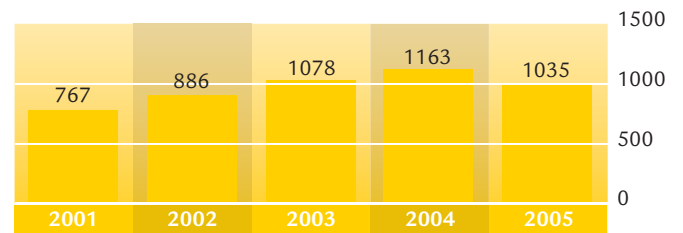

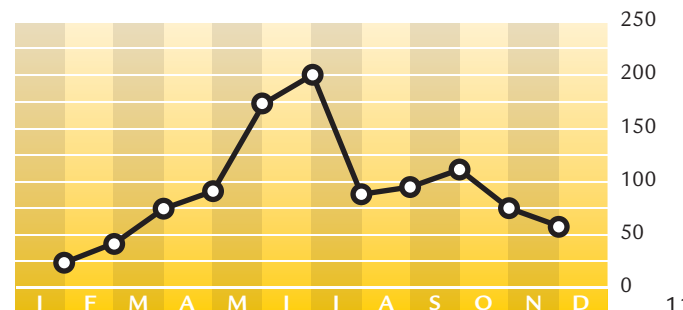

1. Section 118 of the Police Act requires police officers to disclose to their director any revenue other than that from their position as a police officer to ensure it is not earned from sources incompatible with their duties.

2. These sections require the SPVM to notify the Minister of Public Security of allegations of any criminal offence committed by staff members. Upon request of the Minister, the Special Investigations Section must investigate the allegations against its staff or the staff of other police services.

# OUR ENVIRONMENT: evolution of the crime rate

“THE MISSION OF THE MONTRÉAL POLICE SERVICE IS TO MAINTAIN PEACE, ORDER AND PUBLIC SAFETY; PREVENT AND CURB CRIME AND VIOLATIONS OF LAWS OR BY-LAWS ENACTED BY MUNICIPAL AUTHORITIES; AND TO FIND CRIMINALS.” MISSION OF THE SPVM

A TOTAL OF 135,781 CRIMINAL CODE MISDEMEANOURS AND OFFENCES WERE REPORTED IN MONTRÉAL IN 2005, WHICH IS A 0.5% INCREASE OVER 2004.

THE NUMBER OF MISDEMEANOURS REPORTED DROPPED BY 13.2% SINCE 2000 AND 37.9% SINCE 1991, WHEN MORE THAN 218,000 CRIMINAL CODE OFFENCES WERE REPORTED.

## Crimes against property

CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY DROPPED BY 0.5%, DECLINING FROM 97,720 IN 2004 TO 97,268 IN 2005. THE DOWNWARD TREND IN CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY HAS PERSISTED WITH A 15.4% DECREASE BEING RECORDED SINCE 2000 AND 44.5% SINCE 1991.

### **Arson**

After having shot up 18.2% in 2004 (976 misdemeanours reported), the number of acts of arson plummeted 21.2% in 2005 (769 misdemeanours). The number of acts of arson has dropped 23.6% since 2001 and 32.6% over the past decade.

### **Breaking and entering**

The number of incidents of breaking and entering recorded in Montréal (19,533 misdemeanours) shrank 0.2% in 2005. This number has declined for eight years in a row, and burglaries have dropped 40.9% since 1997. By comparison, the number of such incidents was 43,112 in 1991, more than twice as high as the figure for 2005.

In 2005, two out of three burglaries were committed in a residence. For the first time since 1998, the number of home burglaries grew from 12,620 in 2004 to 13,023 in 2005, for an increase of 3.2%. Moreover, the number of home burglaries almost halved (45.0%) since 1998 and dropped 52.1% since 1991.

### **Motor vehicle thefts**

The number of motor vehicle thefts grew for the first time in 8 years from 13,713 in 2004 to 14,129 in 2005, for an increase of 3.0%. However, the situation has clearly improved over the years from 21,621 in 1997 for a 34.7% drop in this type of misdemeanour.

### **Common thefts**

Almost one third of all offences reported in Montréal in 2005 were common thefts. The number of common thefts increased 0.6%, up from 44,004 in 2004 to 44,253 in 2005. Overall, the general downward trend has continued for 15 years: the number of common thefts in 2005 was 5.9% less than in 2000 and 40.2% less than in 1991.

### **Fraud**

In 2005, the 5,532 acts of fraud that were reported represented an 8.1% decline compared to 2004 and 24.6% since 2002. There was a marked decline (16.9%) in the number of acts of fraud pertaining to ATM cards in 2005, and an overall drop (59.7%) since 2000.

### **Mischief**

The number of acts of mischief declined 3.3%, dropping from 12,952 in 2004 to 12,520 in 2005. This number was 18.8% lower than 2000 and has been halved (-51.9%) since 1991, when 26,025 of these misdemeanours were recorded.

## Crimes against persons

IN 2005, 26,707 CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS WERE REPORTED FOR THE TERRITORY, A DECREASE OF 15 COMPARED TO 2004. CRIMES OF VIOLENCE HAVE SLID EVERY YEAR IN THE PAST FIVE YEARS AND, IN 2005, THE NUMBER OF VIOLENT CRIMES WAS 15.6% LOWER THAN IN 2000.

### **Homicides**

The number of homicides decreased from 42 in 2004 to 35 in 2005. This number is well below Montréal's average recorded since 1980 of 65 homicides per year. For the first time since 1970, the number of homicides committed in Montréal is below 40.

### **Attempted murders**

The number of attempted murders rose 5.2%, climbing from 134 in 2004 to 141 in 2005. This type of crime has grown 38.2% since 2001. Despite the rise over the past few years, however, the number of attempted murders in 2005 was less than the average annual number of 142 attempted murders that has been recorded since 1980.

### **Sexual assaults**

A total of 1,750 sexual assaults were reported in 2005, or 8.9% more than in 2004. The number of sexual assaults has risen 18.2% since 2001 and is at its highest in 20 years.

### **Robberies and acts of extortion**

The number of robberies and acts of extortion grew 0.9% from 4,300 in 2004 to 4,340 in 2005. Despite this increase, the number of robberies in Montréal has been virtually halved over the past 15 years.

### **Assaults**

The number of assaults dropped 1.6%, declining from 14,255 in 2004 to 14,027 in 2005. This was the fifth year in a row in which a decline in assaults was recorded, with the number having dropped 20.0% since 2000.

## Other offences under the *Criminal Code*

The number of crimes committed in the "other offences under the *Criminal Code*" category jumped 10.7% in 2005. These crimes included a substantial increase in offences against the administration of justice (22.5%) and fire-arm offences (25.3%).
